

## Deacon Jeff's Corner

My friends, the Lenten season is quickly passing by. If you haven't done so by now, it is time to prepare your heart and soul for what is to come: Palm Sunday, Holy Week including the Last Supper, Good Friday and Holy Saturday, and of course, Easter Sunday. Let's reflect on this for just a moment.

As Christians, we need to prepare for these events. I know that every one of us has a busy life. Life by design is busy, but especially as Catholic Christians, these events are the crux of our faith. I hope this last full week of the Lenten season is one where you can set some time aside for Jesus. Please allow me to offer some suggestions to help:

First and foremost: Pray. This may seem hard but taking a few minutes out of every day for the next two weeks will make Easter Sunday so much more meaningful. Prayer always sounds complicated, but it is simply talking to Jesus. Tell him what's on your mind as you get ready in the morning, when you are going home, or when you are able to just take a few minutes. If you are really bold, come to your church, which is open from 7am through the early evening most every day. Come to the quiet and serenity of the church to maybe shut your mind down and let Jesus do the rest!

Second: What can you do to help others, or sacrifice to change others' lives? We have a blood drive on April 8 from noon-5pm; there's one example right there. If that's not possible, think of what else you might do.

Ultimately, just think of something that might turn your heart more toward Jesus. As someone who worked in the business world for 37 years, I know how it can be ignored, but I also know how it can be so very beneficial not just to you, but to those around you who love you most. Think about it!



<u>Go and Sin No More...</u> By: Theresa Williams

As Lent began on March 5<sup>th</sup> and we received ashes on our forehead, we heard the words, "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." Thus began the 40day journey of Lent 2025. Were you ready to be changed? Were you open to being transformed during this Lenten season? This is a question that each of us, you and me alike, could only answer after an honest conversation with God.

Now, just over a month since Lent began, we hear Jesus in today's Gospel say to the woman caught in adultery, "Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on do not sin anymore." Amazingly, Jesus again says this to each one of us as well. He asks only that we repent from our sins, make necessary changes in our lives, and do our best to avoid sin. As with so many of the Gospel stories, this reading contains so many other messages that Jesus wants us to hear and take to heart. Additionally, Jesus reminds us not to judge others or have a self-righteous attitude towards other people and their sins. (There's another Lent challenge - It's never too late!) The scribes and pharisees not only judged the woman and were ready to stone her but tried to trap Jesus in His response to her predicament. In His response, Jesus said, "Let him who is without sin among you be the first to throw a stone at her." Jesus is calling us to put down our stones and to stop condemning others. He wants us to feel the immense mercy and forgiveness that God the Father bestows on us. He wants us to forgive others and, yes, even to forgive ourselves. God's love is beyond anything we can fathom. Go and sin no more ...



# HOLY WEEK TOUCHSTONES

Holy Week is the most sacred week in the church year because it marks the last week our Savior walked this earth and the week God's plan of salvation came to pass in Christ's journey to the cross and empty grave that we might have forgiveness and life everlasting. Along the way of this week are touchstones, fundamental features that reveal something significant about our God, our life of faith and our Savior. Follow step-by-step through these touchstones of Holy Week on the path to revealing the everlasting goal of heaven.



**Palms** Holy Week begins with Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem, riding on a donkey, with people waving palm branches. These palms are objects used in praise and adoration of a king. We glorify the One who is to come for us this week to show us what a King of Glory is born to do.



**Stones** Jesus said that if the people stopped praising, then the very stones would shout. It is a reminder that all of creation adores the Savior, even those things that are lowly and rugged and earthy.



**Tables of the money-changers** When Jesus turns over the tables of the money-changers who were selling animals for sacrifice, it is a sign for us that Jesus values places of worship as sacred spaces and that he wants us to know that he is the ultimate Sacrifice for us, which is more precious than gold or silver.



Fig tree Jesus proclaims that a withering fig tree he sees will never produce

fruit again. The tree represents those who do not let their faith flourish or grow closer to their Creator in prayer. The strength of the disciples' faith and prayer life is tested in Holy Week.



and wine Bread When Jesus shared bread and wine with his disciples

in the Upper Room on Maundy or Holy Thursday, they partook of his body and blood by his blessing. The sacrament of Holy Communion or the Eucharist was born this day, and each day we take part in it now takes us back to this moment of deep love and forgiveness.



## 30 pieces of silver

Judas Iscariot agrees to betray Jesus into the hands

of the Pharisees for 30 pieces of silver. These coins become a symbol of Judas' attachment to earthly wealth over his attachment to Jesus. We are reminded that we, too, can so easily let money rule over our commitment to Christ.



Gethsemane lesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane on the night he was

betrayed to pray. While the disciples fell asleep, Jesus spoke to his Father, fervently asking that the cup of suffering might be removed, but faithfully accepting the will of God. Our prayers this week should be just as fervent and faithful.



Sword When Jesus was arrested, Peter took his sword and cut off the ear of a servant in the crowd. Jesus heals the man's ear and says that anyone who lives by the sword shall die by the sword. Violence against others is never the answer in the kingdom of God.

Rooster Jesus prophesied that Peter would deny him three times before the rooster crowed. When that happened, Peter went out and wept bitterly. The rooster crow is a wake-up call for us that we can so quickly fall back into sin, but that we still have a Savior who hears our cries for mercy and restores us.



Crown of thorns Meant to be a sign of mockery, the crown of thorns

placed on Jesus' head on Good Friday by the soldiers is a perfect display of the suffering that needs to be endured to usher in the kingdom of grace.



**Cross** One of the most cruel devices of torture and death, the cross stands as

a representation of the depth of pain Christ endured and the power of the victory he accomplished over sin, death and the devil through his death.



**Tomb** The tomb with the stone rolled before it sealed the fact that Jesus was truly

dead. When that same stone was rolled away on Easter, it announced to all the world that Jesus was alive!
